### WHERE WE COME FROM - MAZ: AS I RECALL THE MISSION

Mission Arizona (MAZ) is a week of service and outreach by the La Crescenta Presbyterian Church's Youth Ministries department, designed primarily to serve the Akimel O'odham (Pima) people in the Gila River Indian Community, just south of Phoenix. MAZ started in 1991 and ran until 2017, then took a pause for a few years,



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but is now restarting, once again, in March 2024.

Darren Bottino, the LCPC Junior High Ministries Intern and Fuller Seminary student in the early 1990s designed the first mission trip to Arizona as a part of a research project. He found that Charles H. Cook, a late 19th century Presbyterian missionary to the Pima Indians, was the great-grandfather of our then current pastor, Steven Marsh. Dr. Cook established a theological school with the Pima Indians, the first inhabitants in Tempe, Arizona. In fact, our first three MAZ mission trips worked at the very same school.

Later, MAZ moved toVah Ki Presbyterian Church on the Gila River Indian Reservation, also known as the Gila River Indian Community. The reservation is situated in the Sonoran Desert, one of the harshest environments in North America. Vah Ki Presbyterian was connected with the churches at Stotonic and Sacaton, AZ, all established as mission



churches under the direction of Dr. Cook. The sanctuaries are adobe structures with very few modern upgrades – there are no lighting systems, no TVs, or wireless mics. The worship is simple and traditional.

Since we moved MAZ to the reservation, our youth teams participate in weekly services on Sundays and generally Wednesday evenings. We've been treated to the small choir sing-

ing hymns in the old language, a language that had all but been stamped out. It is always a beautiful experience hearing worship in their language, seeing the joy of it on the elder's faces, and the glee in the children's eyes as they learn the old ways.

A typical day begins with breakfast prepared by the lead cook and the student team assigned KP (continued on page 7)



Dear La Crescenta Presbyterian Church Family & Friends,

On Wednesday, February 14, about 80 people from LCPC and the community gathered in the Sanctuary for our Ash Wednesday service. With the church around the world, we entered together the Season of Lent. Lent is a season of reflection, self-examination, and repentance. It's a season of preparation; preparing ourselves to journey with Christ through His passion, crucifixion, and resurrection. In Mark 1:12-13, we are told that Jesus started His public ministry by a time of reflection, fasting, and communion with God in the wilderness of Judea. "The Spirit immediately drove Him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness forty days, tempted by Satan; and He was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on Him."

I find it amazing that Jesus "was in the wilderness tempted by Satan," surrounded by the wild beasts, yet He was not forgotten by His Father in Heaven; "the angels waited on Him." This is a great picture of the journey of life. It's true that we are tempted by Satan, surrounded by the wild beasts, but always being ministered

to by God's angels and always guided by the Holy Spirit. This is what Jesus experienced in the dessert of Judea and this is what Moses experienced in the Sinai wilderness.

Deuteronomy 34:7, states that Moses lived a hundred and twenty years. His life is divided into three important chapters, each is 40 years long. Moses spent the first forty years of his life in the land of Egypt, in Pharoah's Palace; the second forty years in the wilderness, and the last forty years of his life leading the Israelites out of the land of slavery into the Promised Land. What is amazing to know here is that Moses first encountered God in the wilderness, in the burning bush. Moses did not see God while a Prince in the land of Egypt enjoying the comfort life of Pharaoh's Palace, but rather, in the wilderness.

In our own desert experiences, we are not alone. We are accompanied by our loving, faithful, and trustworthy Father in Heaven. In the wilderness, we can experience the fullness of God's presence, His loving kindness, and the assurance of His provision. I love the words of the book of Deuteronomy 32:10&12: "In



In fact, I just met with him a couple times in January to see how I could serve more specifically in the Taiwanese Church, and he asked me to mentor three of the pastors' wives in a few of those various church locations. It has been an honor and joy to walk alongside each of them individually. Starting mid-February, we will also meet as a foursome every week for prayer, Bible study, and topics I hope to challenge and encourage

for the day. The team moves from breakfast to dressed for work when they report to the fellowship area for a devotional lesson lead by the assigned team, some singing, and a period of quiet time where the team spreads out around the church campus. Work assignments are then handed out and begin for the next three hours until lunch is served. Immediately following lunch, work continues for the next 3-4 hours or until a logical break is established for the various teams. A short period of free time is allowed before dinner which is followed by evening devotions, a group activity, and finally free time before bed.

A typical mission trip includes a frybread dinner hosted by the Vah Ki Pres. congregation. Frybread stations are set up in the outdoor cooking area and the women of the congregation teach the students how to make frybread. The frybreads are used as a base for a tortilla-like salad constructed by each person. The dining hall is filled with students, church them in.

I am also deeply encouraged to be part of a prayer team that brings hope and healing to the hurting people after each church service. I also participate in an inductive Chinese Bible study that I started here over six years ago, which continues to meet weekly under the leadership of someone I trained. There is much joy, depth of discussion, and understanding gleaned as each person shares their insights.

After my morning service on Sundays, I jump on my motorbike to ride over to the Presbyterian Taiwanese English church. I preach

once a month, in addition to helping lead the discussion groups immediately following the sermons each week. We are just starting the Beatitudes, and what a blessing it is (pun intended).

During the week, I work in a counseling center where I have been serving as a volunteer counselor to missionaries all over the island, giving them psychological, emotional, and spiritual support to help them continue their work in the field.

This is an unpaid, full-time position supervising other counselors in the office, while also working with my own clients. This work is like encountering the various traffic lights of green,

members, and folks from the community for a dinner followed by some activity of one kind or another. On two occasions our teams were blessed with the presence of an Eagle Scout and the U.S. Flag adorning the memorial to Ira Hays, the Pima Indian who help raise the flag on Iwo Jima. It was a sobering and well received rite.

Projects over the years include painting nearly every year, general maintenance of one sort or another as the teams see the need, installation and repair of drip systems that water trees, and building concrete walkways to connect the various campus areas to each other to serve the needs of people using walkers and wheelchairs. The MAZ teams have built, rebuilt, and refurbished several arbors used by the congregation and community at large. Concrete walls have been erected to provide windbreaks and slow down the incursion of sand into the outdoor meeting areas. Some of the smaller buildings have been reroofed. During one mission trip, a concrete basketball court was laid and equipped. On another trip, a washed-out adobe wall of a storage area was demolished

red, and sometimes yellow, since life altering breakthroughs with some clients are quick, while other people get stuck at a red light and can't move forward. Thankfully, God is faithful and gets to the crux of the matter and gets the movement of freedom and healing in people's hearts flowing once again. I have volunteered in the counseling center for nine years now as my primary missionary service in Taiwan and have loved it.

Thank you, LCPC, for your ongoing prayer and financial support. At this time, I truly covet your prayers for 1) greater retention of the Chi-



nese language as I study, 2) anointing as I preach each month, 3) wisdom as I mentor the three pastors' wives, 4) breakthroughs for each client in the counseling center and 5) that I am able to cover the increasing cost-of-living (and expected loss of income from a couple of my long-term supporters due to their elderly age), so that I may continue my ministry here. It is only through the support of individual financial partners that I am able to do

this work, helping to grow the Kingdom in this nation, which is less than 5% Christian.

Additionally, we may also be involved some needed repairs connected to the church at Vah Ki and the large arbor we sleep under, both recently hit by high winds. This will be a challenge to complete over our four and a half to five days of work and your prayers are appreciated.

The LCPC Missions Team has allocated enough funds to provide materials and supplies for the projects. They are an awesome crew! Our fundraising will provide for the expense of travel, food, housing, and fellowship supplies. We are currently selling shares of stock in the mission after Sunday services and will host a shareholder meeting sometime in April.

## Director's Corner

As I talk to parents about their children going into T-K or kindergarten it reminds me how committed I am to the educational philosophy of our program. We believe that early childhood education forms a child's approach to learning and that we want children to investigate, observe and explore the world around them. We believe that it is more important to handle groups of 4: 4 blocks, 4 seashells, 4 buttons, 4 cars and to sing about groups of 5: 5 little monkeys, 5 dinosaurs and to set a table with 6 plates, 6 napkins, 6 forks than to write these numbers on a ditto page numerous times in a row.

We hunt for things that start with a "b" sound in our rooms, like balls, blankets, books rather than flipping through flashcards and naming the letters. We expose children to letters, numbers, size, sequence, patterns and shapes in all the activities that we carefully plan for the classroom. Writing implements and paper are available in classes and games that use counting, matching and thinking.

Written language is shared by reading to children and by having children dictate stories to the teacher. Books and games that have them playing with rhymes helps them identify ending sounds as well as beginning sounds and help them to find patterns in words. As parents it might be more difficult to see the "academic" progress you child is experiencing here without a worksheet as proof, but we ask you to look deeper and see the amazing things your children are doing here.

In February I saw a class asked how many children thought the ground hog would see his shadow. The teacher talked about how 9 out of 15 of us thought he would see his shadow and that that is more than half the class, wow! That is real math in a real world. In another class the children were guessing how many buttons were

It is kind of amazing how much we do in a single day, and we know you continue this at home.

So next time you get a marble painting at home, don't just think isn't this cute. Think, boy, my child was strengthening his/her eye muscles by tracking the marble and was learning about gravity because if I lower one side of the box the marble moves towards that end. Learning through play and protecting childhood are at the heart of the CFC curriculum. Our T-K class here at CFC gets kids ready for Kindergarten and keeps the spark of learning ignited.
