EATON FIRE RECOVERY TASK FORCE UPDATE

FINAL RESULTS OF FUNDRAISING CAMPAIGN

Praise be to God and thank you to everyone who helped us beat our fundraising target! Our final tally was \$\$179,118, including the benefit of the full \$75,000 matching grant. Now all of our energy can go towards putting this money to work, through the highly effective Christian ministries with which we've chosen to partner: Door of Hope, Habitat for Humanity, and at least one other ministry still to be chosen.

SEEKING VOLUNTEERS!

As communicated from the outset, LCPC has committed to providing long-term support for economically-challenged families impacted by the Eaton Fire, through both our financial gifts and, perhaps even more important, our gifts of time and talent. Now's the time to express your interest in the specific opportunities before us!

As part of the Task Force's decision-making process on resource allocation, we need to assess interest in the various volunteer opportunities presented by our partner ministries. While specific dates of service have not yet been identified – and we understand that no personal commitments can be made until the dates are finalized – we do need to have some sense of the numbers of volunteers we will be able to bring to these efforts. We are also seeking to go beyond LCPC,

PASTOR'S LETTER

Greetings, La Crescenta Presbyterian Church Family & Friends,

Several years ago, when we lived in Southern NJ, we had a neighbor across the street who was an artist. He was quite a good artist in my mind. He had great paintings and photographs as well. When you got to know him, it was obvious that he was always on the lookout for the perfect view for the next painting or photo shoot.

One day during a snowstorm I heard something outside. It was like someone was out there doing something to our house. I headed to the front door just to take a look. It was then that I saw him.

The noise we heard was our neighbor gathering up our trash and recycle cans and putting them away. It was strange. The trash collection had just taken place and there was our neighbor putting away our trash and recycle cans. I thought to do that, but it was freezing outside, and I decided to do it when I go to shovel.

Why would someone go through the trouble of putting away someone else's trash cans? I was not willing to let this question torture me, so I ventured outside in the cold and asked our neighbor, "Why are you putting away our trash and recycle cans?" our neighbor immediate response, "The snow" he said. Then I had to ask, "What do you mean 'the snow?"

"Well, the trash and recycle cans ruined the view. When I was in my living room by the fireplace, I was watching the beautiful snow fall. As I looked, I couldn't get over how the trash cans were ruining the aesthetic beauty of the snow. Now with them out of my way I can look at your wonderful yard, the bushes and trees and watch the snow fall unfettered" was his answer.

As I think about our life as a congregation as well as our spiritual journey as individuals,

two questions come to my mind. First, do you ever look intentionally for beautiful views? I am sure that often times we all set out to find a beautiful, picturesque site. In the spiritual



realm, do you ever look intentionally for beautiful views? Open your eyes. As I think about our Holy Week services and activities, I can say that I have seen a lot of those beautiful views and wonderful moments. As a matter of fact, I get to see them in our Sunday services, during our coffee hour, fellowship time, potlucks, and in many small group settings. Open your eyes.








Greetings LCPC! It's my month to share about my life and ministry in Taiwan. While I have continued the ministries I've written to you about before, there is one exciting new ministry that I've been co-leading since last year's update. Since August of 2024, my friend Jacob and I have been praying weekly about starting a bilingual English/Chinese church

to join us in this endeavor and vision. It meant the world to us that our Chinese pastor, who is the primary leader over the main church as well as assisting 12 other pastors who he sent out to do church planting in other areas of the city over the last 20+ years, made this huge commitment to our vision. He is a visionary himself (and a BUSY man) and yet he caught, grabbed onto and fully embraced our vision as his own! Our pastor put the word out that we were looking for people to assist us in English/ Chinese translation, worship team and welcoming committee. We are truly blessed to say that there are now 12 faithful men and women serving alongside us as our teammates. Because our sermons are all translated into Chinese (so the congregation hears the message in both English and Chinese), the greatest need was translators, and God gave us five of them. That means they only need to translate once a month, which really makes the task manageable.

Since the first of February, we have been



Finally, a personal note... with deep sadness, I had to leave Taiwan and my various ministries due to my mother's sudden death. She awoke March 12th with half her body paralyzed, went to emergency to find out she had an inoperable brain hemorrhage, and on March 14th, passed away. Because I was scheduled and fully prepared to preach on March 16th, I fulfilled that obligation and returned to the US on March 17th to facilitate a celebration of my mom's life with her closest friends, and to clear out her belongings from her rental house. Though I rejoice greatly that my mom had a deep conversion to following Jesus in the past few years, I covet your prayers in this difficult time of grieving. I plan on staying home for a couple months this summer and hope to deeply rest and recover so I can resume all my ministry back in Taiwan in August.

service. Our vision is that the gospel message will become common knowledge in our city of Taichung due to a large and growing number of those living the Christian life and participating in sharing the message inside and especially outside of the church. We desire to ground people in the Word of God, and especially to mentor and equip them to share the good news with those around them.

When we were looking for people to join us and be a part of this team, we didn't want to put any added pressure on already overworked church members. We told our head pastor we just wanted to pray for helpers to volunteer. Every Thursday morning since November, from 8:00-8:30 A.M., our head pastor joined us in prayer and the three of us have prayed and sought the Lord for brothers and sisters

working through the book of Ephesians, emphasizing Gospel truths about being adopted and chosen into God's family, being saved by grace through the blood of Jesus, and being created to do good works which God prepared in advance for us to do. I preach one time a month and thoroughly love teaching and sharing the truths of God's word, while continuing my main work as a counselor to missionaries and members of their families living in Taiwan at a Christian Counseling center. This counseling work has been my primary ministry for the past ten years, which was expanded to include supervisory responsibilities over the past four years. To keep the cost of these counseling services affordable to the missionary families who desperately need them, all of the counselors serve on a volunteer basis; I am only able to



So please join me in warmly welcoming Arpy. We can't wait to get to know her.


