Greetings LCPC family! It's the time of year when we're in between seasons here in Nigeria. Dry season is slowly loosening its grip, the temperature and humidity are rising and we see clouds which promise the rains are not far off. Transitions - they are constant in our lives and we've weathered many during our 14 years in Jos, Nigeria.

Just to remind you, Nigeria has the third greatest remaining Bible translation needs in the world. There are more than 500 languages in Nigeria, and at least 170 languages are yet to have any Bible translation work started. The country is split rather evenly between Christianity and Islam, and there is still a lot of remaining work to be done.

Robyn is serving on the Human Resources team for Nigeria Group. Over the past six months, we've added almost 30 new staff mem-


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bers. Most of them are Nigerian by nationality, but they represent a variety of Nigerian cultures. One of the aspects of Robyn's work is to facilitate cross-cultural training for our staff, which involves assisting small groups to engage in cross-cultural conversations. Our new Nigerian staff are learning to work alongside expatriates from several different countries, and they are also learning about our corporate mission culture. Robyn also assumed the role of Prayer Coordinator for our Area last year, which - requires her to

: the past year, he implemented an internship
- pilot program which recruited 25 interns from
- seven countries serving in three key areas that
- enable translation work to be expanded: literacy
- \& education, Bible translation, and language
program management (LPM).
Another initiative for this year is to form a team of (mostly) local staff from Africa who will cast the vision for fundraising within the African Church. From the early days of missions in Africa, the majority of resources (people and money) came from the western Church (North America \& Europe). However, a healthy and mature church should be supporting itself and giving to others in need. Today the "majority world" is sending more new missionaries than the west. But the funding for most of Wycliffe's work in Bible translation still mainly comes from the west. This means that many African Christians are missing out on the blessings of giving. In January, we started recruiting some local staff from six countries in Africa to lead this effort; the team came together for training in January and February, and the work continues.

Another God-sized effort in Nigeria is called the Mark Road cluster project. This is a four-year project to engage 40 of the language

communities without any Scripture. It uses an innovative approach that equips and empowers the church and community to take increasing responsibility for Bible translation in their language. The project was launched in October, and gives language communities time to explore different options available such as oral Bible storying, oral Bible translation, written translation, full testaments, a survey of Scriptures, or a summary of Scriptures. It's called "Mark Road" because it starts Bible translation with a single story in Mark (and expands from there).

## P A S T O R'S LET T E R

Friends,
The post-Resurrection story of Jesus and the two disciples of Emmaus in Luke 24:13-35 gives me so much hope, because it tells me a little something about the people who experience Jesus' comforting presence. Jesus didn't come to those who had it all figured out. He didn't walk with people who were able to keep a smile on their face while their world was coming to an end. Instead, He comes to those who are disappointed, doubtful like Thomas, and discontent. Jesus comes to those who don't know their Bibles well, who don't recognize Him even when He's walking right beside them. He comes to those who have given up, who have thrown in their towel and are headed back home. He comes to people like us.

It's Easter Sunday, and Cleopas and the other unnamed person, two followers of Jesus, are traveling back to Emmaus from Jerusalem, where some amazing and perplexing things have happened. So here's my question: If there's talk of a missing body and appearing angels and a risen Savior in Jerusalem, why are they leaving? If I were them, I would want to stick around, to find out what's going on. Why are
they heading out of town when all the answers are behind them? Because what's behind them represents the destruction of their dreams. How often have we walked lonely roads and gone through difficult times thinking we are all alone, only to find out that Jesus was walking beside us and we didn't even know it. This is an important lesson, because it gives me hope to know that God won't stop walking beside me just because I don't acknowledge His presence. After the travelers pour out their hearts, Jesus responds by showing them His hands and feet establishing the fact that He was not a ghost, but He is for real.

Jesus is alive, He is real, and He is present. There are so many things that we will never be able to understand on this side of Heaven. But one thing we should never doubt and that's the presence of our trustworthy God as we wrestle with the many unanswered questions of life. Thankfully, the travelers invite Jesus to stay with them, and they are given a transformed view of this stranger in their midst.

Like the two disciples of Emmaus, we, too, are on a journey. And I bet that somewhere along this journey we call life, we will run into

## Director's Corner

A language rich environment is one in which children are surrounded by talking, singing, and reading and have many opportunities throughout their day, across all activities, to communicate with others and engage in back-and-forth conversations. A rich language environment is important to children's early learning, and can have strong effects on early language, vocabulary, reading, and math skills, as well as on children's social-emotional development.

Research shows that some young children are exposed to more language in their homes, early learning programs, and school settings, than other children. This difference in the number of words and back-and-forth conversations to which children are exposed is called the "word gap."

Teachers and families play a critical role in developing language-rich learning environments. Try these strategies to engage all children in rich conversations in English or in their home language.

- Get down on the child's level.
- Tune in and listen to what the child says. If the child does not speak yet, tune into what they are doing or pointing to and use these moments to talk with them.
- Take turns talking. If the child doesn't have language yet, that may mean you are talking and the child is communicating in nonverbal ways, such as through gestures, looks, smiles, babbles, and word approximations (children's attempts at words).
- Talk about what the child is doing, what the child is looking at, or what the child is interested in.
- Ask questions that relate to the child's experiences or interests.
- Add words or questions to what the child says or does and model new language.
- Give the child enough time to respond. For children who do not have language yet, this may be a nonverbal response, like a gesture or a look.
- Stay tuned in to the child's facial and body expressions to make sure they are engaged.
- Expand phrases so they are complete.
- Add novel and interesting words.
- Make phrases more complex.
- Summarize their thoughts.
